### **Education**

## **CBE Rep**

We've got a new CBE Rep: please welcome Joyce Xu! We had 9 applicants and 8 interviews for the position over the last week. We had the fortunate problems of great applicants, and I'm looking forward to working with Joyce for the rest of 2014.

# **First Year Camps**

First Year Camps have concluded for the year. Big thanks to Laura who managed the camps, all the College Representatives who ran the camps, and Annika who went along to two of them. We've shown again that the concept of First Year Camp is great!

I'm not sure of the numbers - Laura can probably say - but we had a big increase in turnout with 253~ students turning up. We can attribute this partly to the excellent organisation and the big hustles from our reps to get people there.

There is an incident that is currently under investigation. We can't comment about much but we can say that we improved our training for camp mentors/college representatives and developed an critical incident policy. I'll ensure that we do a good handover for the next ANUSA because I think that these camps are big tasks that are organised concurrently with O-Week and are at risk of not being paid enough attention.

# "Go8 Sell Out"

We noticed a bit of interest around the Group of Eight Submission to the Kemp-Norton review. We decided to comment, make our position clear on the issue, clarify what was going on and also connect it to our Higher Education campaign this year. We wrote a post (<a href="http://www.anusa.com.au/uncappedfees/">http://www.anusa.com.au/uncappedfees/</a>) that went pretty viral with almost 150 likes on a text-heavy post. This was a big win because one my goals this year (noted later) is to help bring education issues to the fore for most students.

#### **Seminars**

Seminars are the 3 hour "interactive" format that are one of the forms of education delivery at ANU (an alternative to the lecture + tutorial format)s. They're not new but they were part of the the "tutorial cuts" controversy. We've

been promised time and time again by the university that these are being done in a way that has "pedagogical basis".

We've been receiving reports that there's a few subjects are using the fora as a 3 hour lecture. This is contrary to promises, a poor use of time and a source of frustration for students who expect an interactive education. I've mentioned it to the Marnie Hughes-Warrington (Academic) who was shocked but didn't commit to doing much. Annika said she's interested in running some kind of survey or at least seek feedback on seminars. I agree - I think this is an area that more and more schools might force their academics to move towards due to being cheaper under the guise of "having pedagogical basis". # Hot Topic 2: Undergraduates and our place at ANU

In 2014, post-graduates are the priority to the ANU. ANU is focused on being "ANU's finest university" which is determined on, by both ANU's internal KPIs and international rankings, the quality of research output - something that is more obviously linked to postgraduates.

ANU is starting to act on these aims. Numbers of postgraduates have been increasing: In the 2012 Annual Report, there were only just less postgraduates than undergraduates reported (9700 $\sim$  to 10,500). The 2013 Annual Report is not yet out but it wouldn't surprise me if postgraduates have had a proportional increase. It's been hinted in the university that they are looking for a significant increase in student population and it could achieve this focus on boosting postgraduates numbers. PARSA is reaching an operational budget close in size to ANUSA with pressure coming from the university to expand their activities. Anecdotally, more and more focus is being placed on postgraduates and their student experience.

While ANUSA supports more support and attention paid to any type student at ANU, we must also ensure that undergraduates are appropriately represented. I believe that undergraduates have a critical importance to ANU; it isn't as as obvious but is just as crucially important to the future of ANU. It's our responsibility to advocate the importance of undergraduates both for their sake but also to ensure that ANU stays "Australia's finest university"

I had a quick brainstorm about why undergraduates are important for a few reasons. Firstly and most obvious to the university: income. Undergraduates are a significant revenue stream for ANU. Like the other Group of 8 universities, ANU uses undergraduates (who are "profitable" to teach) to cross-subsidise research around the university (which can be many, many times over more expensive per student due to resource needs such as supercomputers etc). Secondly, undergraduates are a necessary resource for ... postgraduates who are necessary for research! Thirdly, ANU has been on a hunt for philanthropy and the brunt of donations come from undergraduates (I've heard, I need to get some data on

this). I'm sure there's more and would appreciate anything I haven't thought of.

I'd like to propose having a "symposium" of people around ANU who could come together to discuss the importance of undergraduates to ANU. The result of this symposium would be a short paper discussing the importance of undergraduates at ANU and a list of possible measures to create bonds between undergraduates and ANU's mission.

I met with Stephen Milnes, 2IC of DSL (I'm pretty sure that his title has officially changed now) on Thursday 13/3. Just briefly, he said his three priorities for this year

Since the last CRC on 25 February, we have not had a great deal to report on. There was Hot Topic discussion group in Week 2 but we were unable to attend due to other commitments and communication mishap. The forum discussed CASS Honours. Please refer to the minutes of that meeting, available on CASS Intranet.

### First Year CASS Camp

- First Year Camp was a huge success. We had 84 people in attendance, including CASS and CAP students and mentors. There were no major issues to report on. Special thanks go to Elisabeth Findlay for supporting the camp and giving her time to visit us on the weekend. Cheers also to Laura and Annika for their massive contributions and to our incredible team of mentors: Elsie, Josh, Azim, Declan, Daniel, Annabel and Jacqueline.
- We think it is relevant to discuss the stricter regulations, which affected CASS/CAP camp following the other two camps, and the way in which the ANU Policy was put into force. While we appreciate and understand the reasons behind the ANU's response, we were disappointed with the lack of consultation with us as camp organisers and with mentors. We were placed in a difficult position, having to change the rules for mentors days before departure and redefine their role on camp.
- Fortunately, our first year cohort was fantastic and made this policy change effectively a non-issue. Given the overwhelmingly positive feedback from first year students (see Nick Horton for documentation), we would continue to advocate for First Year Camps to run into the future. However, we would suggest that future camps be run according to clear and consistently applied policies, which are available well in advance to recognise the many months of planning by students that make camp happen.

**COLLEGE OF ASIA AND THE PACIFIC** *NICK HORTON AND ALICE DAWKINS* 

### First Year Camp:

- <u>Key Achievements</u>
  - Following an intensive campaign of lecture attendance, email circulations, and a lucky draw prize for a Palace Electric double pass, we managed to sell 25 tickets for the camp with only one noshow

- Despite having two mentors drop out, we found the 8:24 mentormentee ratio ideal for facilitating individualised consultation without being too intimidating
- For the first time, almost all languages/majors were represented by mentors in their presentations, with the general message to students inviting them to experiment with their learning beyond their defined pathways
- The students had the opportunity to meet their Acting Dean,
   Andrew Walker, in a relaxed environment a rare chance
- Student's expectations for the academic consultations were discovered to be centred largely around exchange opportunities, scholarships, internships, honours, and career advice. We were successful in covering these bases extremely thoroughly.
- The social events were incident-free, with only a small number of CAP students even drinking their allocated amount of drinks on the Saturday night

# • Recommendations

- Camp model worked very well but it would be worth considering other more accessible options, so that more CAP students can benefit from the rare chance to access mentoring and advice from the high-quality students we attracted as mentors
- Mentor-mentee integration and mingling would have been far easier if their wasn't such a clearly defined divide between the two groups, made clear by mentors being required to sleep in separate dorms and wear 'mentor' shirts.
- Discussion Point: Some mentors mentioned that a separate camp model may better serve the interests of fostering stronger mentormentee relationships. This is something that ANUSA should consider for future camp models. There are significant benefits and disadvantages for both models.

# • Other

- Mentors were thanked for their services at a dinner paid out of our Faculty Representative budget on Sunday night, after our return to Canberra. It was a very well received 'thank-you' and they left feeling very positive about the camp and their involvement.
- In the coming weeks we will be compiling the collected survey results and writing a report, which will be submitted to the Sub-Dean, Dean, ANUSA Executive, CRC and College Education Committee.

- Chose a new College Rep partner, Joyce Xu.

- So far, we are going to focus on improving the feedback mechanisms between students and the CBE. The CBE is very concerned with student feedback as around 11.8% of courses had <50% agreement rates for SELT, the worst in the ANU. We're working through ways to increase student participation in these surveys to have a better picture of what students think.
- We're also trying to get more exposure by funnelling CBE events and initiatives through a single advertising medium. This would allow CBE students to obtain a lot of important information for the week from a single source.

• We're also working on maintaining a good relationship with the first-years who went on the camp to keep that connection with the first-year cohort. Any projects we do to enhance student engagement, such as the possibility of a mentoring program within the CBE will also be targeted at the first-years to maximise return.

- SELTS scores: Percentages have increased in Computer Science and decreased in Engineering.
- They've included a new Engineering Major/Minor Bio and Nano systems which is planned to roll out by next year.
- ANU are trying to extend the PhB to all colleges and CECS are sceptical
  particularly because it clashes with their already existing and proven R&D
  programme. So its likely they'll either reshape R&D to fit the specs for a
